Junior A Football 1999 to 2011 - By John Garvey

Not since 1990 did Naomh Olaf have a Junior Division 1 football team. However, having joined forces with Dundrum / Churchtown in 1999, Naomh Olaf again had a team at this level. The period 1999-2011 was exciting, especially in the early years, when this group was capable of stepping toe to toe with any of their contemporaries and coming out on top.

This group performed most consistently in the Junior A Championship. Each year from 1999 through until 2008, the team won all their first and second round games plus quarter-final games in the Junior A Championship; they contested nine successive Junior Championship quarter-finals and five semifinals, playing a total of 35 championship games, winning 20, drawing 2 and losing 13. However, the Holy Grail was not achieved during this spell and with a little luck, and a more concerted effort, both league and championship success could have been achieved.

The only piece of silverware was a Conlon Cup victory in 2003; again it showed Naomh Olaf were always at their best when facing perceived superior opposition.

Starting off in 1999, this Junior team was a blend of youth and experience. The experience came mainly from Dundrum / Churchtown - Mayo man Ray Greally, a fine experienced corner-back; John Davitt at centre-half back won an Intermediate Championship in London with Shannon Rovers; Seamus Mac Gabhann at mid-field played Minor football for Dublin; Enda Holmes on the half-forward line who is a brother of the Mayo player, Pat Holmes, and Enda Deignan at full-forward played Senior football for

Sligo. In addition, Michael Byrne and Caomhán Bermingham were experienced Senior footballers, while Brian de Veale had already won Junior and Intermediate Championships with the club. Many of the club's most talented young players gained much from the experience of playing adult football at this level - players such as Eoin Hayes in goal, Emmet O'Grady in defence, Kevin Birrane, Ronan Hegarty, Eoin Kinsella and Eoin Leavy in the attack.

As the years moved on, more of the club's younger players came to adult football through the Junior A route. Mick Neill, Malachy Coughlan, Stephen Browne, Seamas Kinsella, Lorcan Kinsella, Conor Sobolewski, John McGrath, Shane Whyte, Chris Fennell, Gary Wilkins, Ciarán Hegarty, Conor Haskins, David Lynch and Colin Doyle spring to mind.

In the latter years, when the same application to training and playing was not evident, the results followed suit, which was a pity as the true potential of this group was not realised.

The following pages hopefully give a flavour of the teams and the competitions that were contested during this period. If there are any inaccuracies in the reports and content, they are not intentional and hopefully nobody is offended.

The high and lows of 1999 to 2011

1999: Junior As reach championship semi-final only to be beaten by eventual winner Fingal Ravens by one point.

2000: Team ended up as runners-up in the league, and were narrowly beaten in the championship quarter-final by eventual winners St Finian's of Swords,

who, as it turned out, went on to win Intermediate Championship in 2001.

2001: Team lost in championship quarter-final to St Brigid's.

2002: Team lost in extra time of championship quarter-final replay to Thomas Davis.

2003: Conlon Cup was won defeating St Finian's (N) in the final, but lost championship semi-final to the eventual winners Lucan. Won the St Mark's Tournament

2004: Reached the championship semi-final, but lost to eventual winners Naomh Mearnóg. Won the league promotion play-off semi-final vs Kilmacud but lost the final vs St Finian's.

2005: Reached the championship semi-final, but lost to Round Towers. Reached league promotion playoffs, only to lose narrowly to St Brigid's.

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2006: Reached the championship semi-final, but lost to Castleknock. This was after a protracted wait from the quarter-final victory, due to unfounded and withdrawn objections. Also reached league promotion play-offs, only to lose narrowly to St Brigid's again.

2007: Reached the championship quarter-final, but lost to Whitehall.

2008: The first year this team had not reached the championship quarter-final. They were beaten in first round by a very skilful and up-and-coming team in St Oliver Plunkett's ER.

2009: Won championship first round but lost the second round to Man O' War.

2010: Won championship first round but lost the second round game to the eventual finalists St Jude's.

2011: Lost the championship first round away to Man O' War.

This competition was played on a league basis for Inter Div. 2 and some Junior Div. 1 teams. As seen from the results, it was a mixed bag and the team did not qualify for the semi-final.

Junior A Football League 1999

The league campaign started off on 7th March, with a narrow loss to Ballyboughal. As the season progressed, this panel became more of a team and gave a good account in the league, finishing strongly in the last series of games.

Junior A Football Championship 1999

This team's first championship game was to be a stern test against St Finian's of Newcastle in O'Toole Pk. The teams were very equally matched but the hunger of the Olaf's team, and the impact Ronan Hegarty had as a third midfielder, most likely swayed the tie in Olaf's favour.

The team had a great victory in the second round vs. Bank of Ireland. This game was played at true championship pace, with Bank of Ireland putting up a stern test in the first half, but Olaf's pulled away comfortably in the end with all six forwards getting on the score sheet.

Olaf's next game was the Championship quarter-final vs Ballyboughal, played in Balgriffin on August 6th 1999. This game was nip and tuck all through, until a decisive goal by Eoin Leavy turned the game in Olaf's favour, sending Olaf's through to the Junior semi-final, where the opponents were Fingal Ravens.

The semi-final of Junior A Championship vs Fingal Ravens was played in O'Toole Park on August 20th 1999. Olaf's started off in flying form and an early goal, compliments of Damien McDonnell, set the tone of the game; this was quickly followed up by two goals from sharpshooter Enda Deignan following some good interplay between the forwards. Caomhán Bermingham added a point, Olaf's only other score for the first half

The second half began with Fingal Ravens having a goal disallowed for a square infringement. The signs were good for a Naomh Olaf win, but in true fashion of North County Dublin teams, the Ravens never gave up and continued to pick off points and eventually took the lead in the closing minutes. Olaf's mounted a frantic final attack but a couple of astute interceptions foiled the best efforts of Olaf's forwards. Try as they did, they could not get the equalizer, which would have been a fair result. Fingal Ravens ran out winners by a solitary point. Ravens went on to win the Junior A championship and in a short few years progressed to Senior Division 1 status.

Naomh Olaf made a Lazarus-like comeback from a nine-point deficit to grab victory in the dying minutes of the local derby at Wedgewood last Sunday. Malachy Coughlan's injury time point was enough to seal the win by a single score in this exciting Dublin League Division 5 game.

Considering Kilmacud Crokes' position with ten minutes remaining, leading 0-10 to 0-3, they will feel this was one that got away. Crokes were in complete control of the game, and possession, until midway through the second period. Four early points set the first half tone. The game shifted significantly in Crokes' favour with the dismissal of Olaf's midfielder Robert Quinn on 14 minutes for retaliation on Mark Kane, who had made the initial foul. Crokes profited from the extra space in midfield to increase the pressure on Olaf's defence, leaving them six points clear of the scoreless Sandyford outfit at the break.

Early in the second half, Crokes appeared to have wrapped up the contest as they rattled up three further points.

However, the introduction at half-time of Shane Whyte changed the course of the match. He contributed 1-1 to the cause and was instrumental in Olaf's vital second goal. After 40 minutes, Whyte

opened his team's account with a well-struck point. Thereafter John Garvey's crew controlled possession and all Enda Deignan's hard work was rewarded with two points in succession midway through the half. The never-say-die attitude of men like Eoin Brennan and Seamus Mac Gabhann proved vital in filling the midfield void left by Quinn's departure and they helped turn the game Naomh Olaf's way.

Yet it was undoubtedly the talented Whyte, who even had a goal disallowed, who stole the show with his all-action second half performance. Naomh Olaf's superior fitness showed in the final quarter. Whyte's expertly-taken goal left the difference at four points with nine minutes remaining. The introduction of replacement Ray Naughton moments later was significant. A Coughlan free reduced the sides to one goal, which duly arrived with five minutes left after an electrifying run by Whyte led to Naughton firing home a goal from close in, to complete a remarkable comeback. The Crokes players appeared to be dead

on their feet as Olaf's snatched a late victory with Coughlan calmly splitting the uprights from wide on the left.

Three early second-half goals proved to be a bridge too far for a resilient Templeogue/Synge St as they bowed out of the Dublin Junior Football Championship on Sunday evening. Olaf's weathered a late storm from the home side to deservedly progress from this second round fixture after a hard-fought battle in Dolphin's Barn.

Early in the second half, TSS were trailing by nine points, until a remarkable revival transformed the game and had TSS leading by a point, entering the final ten minutes. It required Olaf's most durable disciples, Paddy Roe and Robert Quinn, to lift their games to new heights to manufacture the all- important late scores and ensure victory. The first half finished 1-5 apiece with TSS reeling Olaf's back in on two occasions; first after Brian Begley's goal and secondly with a converted penalty after 22 minutes. Begley's goal put Olaf's into an early 1-2 to 0-2 lead but two frees cut the deficit. Points from Michael Neill (2) and Enda Deignan put the Olaf's team in the ascendancy once more but Scully's penalty and another Cullen free left it all square at the break. With the second half still in its infancy, Olaf's goalblitz began in earnest via the boot of Begley, thanks to a clever flick from marauding midfielder Quinn.

Three minutes later good combination play between Roe and Malachy Coughlan allowed Begley to complete his hat-trick. Before the dust had even settled on the last two goals, Quinn caused further misery as he weighed in with another goal to leave Tem-

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pleogue Synge St with a mountain to climb. They came very close to the summit. Instantly, Browne attacked from midfield brushing off a challenge to unleash a tame shot that trickled under the legs of Olaf's keeper Philip Byrne.

This goal proved the catalyst for a highly impressive and spirited revival from 'Synger' who accumulated 0-7 in a 12 minute spell to lead 2-12 to 4-05 with less than 10 minutes left. Substitutes Danny O'Reilly and Eoghan O'Gara added fresh impetus to the side's endeavours, and scores from Derek Cullen (0-3) were vital in the remarkable comeback. With both teams now in Championship mode, the intensity levels escalated. However, Olaf's won the scrap for possession to gain a vital two-point cushion via points from Kevin Doolan and Roe (2). TSS did reply with the point of the match in the final minute but only a goal would have saved them as Olaf's found the extra gear with points from Rory Kennelly and Paddy Roe to earn the spoils.

The Story behind our Club Crest and Colours - By Margaret Kyne-Delaney



The current Naomh Olaf crest was designed in 1999 after the amalgamation of Naomh Olaf and Dundrum / Churchtown GAA clubs. The new crest was designed to take in elements of both clubs and to represent the wider community

that the club now embodied.

The crest is made up of four images that represent the two clubs and the expanded catchment area which resulted from the amalgamation.



The two maroon-coloured sections came directly from the Dundrum / Churchtown crest.

The Usher Monument represents the Dundrum area of the club's catchment area. Dr Isaac Usher was a popular resident of Dundrum in the early 20th Century. He did a lot for the town but unfortunately he was killed in one of the first accidents involving a motor car in Ireland, when a car struck him while reversing near the railway station in 1917. The residents decided to build a monument to honour him.



The Bottle Tower represents the Churchtown area of the club's catchment area. The Bottle Tower is a structure on Whitehall Road. It is a folly built in the terrible

winter of 1741-42, by Major Hall, as relief work for the poor. It gives its name to the nearby pub, which nowadays is much better known.



The two blue sections were added to represent the Naomh Olaf side of the club and both came from the crest of King Olaf.



Balally is named after Olaf (Amhlaoibh), the first King of Viking Dublin, who is reputed to have built a fort in the locality. The place name Baile Mhic Amhlaoibh,

meaning "the town of the son of Olaf" was anglicised as Balally. The Viking ship was an integral part of his family crest and represents the Balally catchment area.

The raven represents the Olaf coat of arms and signifies the Sandyford area of the club's catchment area leading up to the Dublin Mountains. The raven is thought to represent Raven's Rock which is located above Curtlestown Wood and is a large rock face with excellent views over Dublin and Wicklow. It is on the Wicklow Way.

Meet our club mascot "Olaf the Viking"



To coincide with the 30th anniversary of the launch of the club, the Juvenile section has launched a new Club Academy mascot – "Olaf the Viking". Olaf the Viking was the brain child of Darren Egan, one of our current club coaches. He felt that Naomh Olaf needed a mascot for the Academy section of the club. A small team set to work and found a Viking image and customized it to fit what we wanted him to represent.

This image was designed by Paddy Cahill, Balally Avenue. It shows our club colours, our name, and a football and hurley. It was created in the 1990s, one evening after a discussion between a number of mentors. It was created and drawn up in 20 minutes.



Naomh Olaf Senior Football 2003 to 2009 -By John McGrath

In the twenty two years since its foundation, Naomh Olaf had almost reached the pinnacle of Dublin football. The high point was probably reaching the Senior Championship semi-final. The departure of Tommy Brennan marked the beginning of a new era for football at the club. It was a period which was to see some of the players who had contributed to the team's success step up into management. It was also a period in which outside managers were recruited.

The team itself also went through great change. Gone were many of the stars who had played so well under the stewardship of Tommy Brennan. New players came from the club's juvenile ranks and from counties all over Ireland. On the pitch, the high standard of club football in Dublin became very clear. The team seemed to be in an endless battle to retain its senior status in the county. This, however, was also a period of great excitement. The battles which were fought were memorable. The pride the players showed in the club and the jersey was remarkable. Supporters revelled in the games which were played with everything at stake.

2003

Aidan Byrne was appointed senior football manager following the resignation of Tommy Brennan. Aidan had been one of the stalwarts in the halfback line through many of the team's great days.

The team was in Division 1 of the league. The season got off to a great start with a win over St Vincent's by a score of 8 points to 6. This was followed by another success against Ballyboden St Enda's. After four games, the team had seven points and all

looked bright for a good season. However from then on, results did not go well and the team fell into the relegation zone. Despite a good win against Craobh Chiaráin, the slide could not be halted and Naomh Olaf were relegated to Division 2. Aidan Byrne could not continue as team manager for family reasons.

2004

Following the resignation of Aidan Byrne, the club appointed Kevin Curtin as team manager. Discussions had taken place with Liam Connor. Liam was

part of the Offaly team that denied Kerry the 'five-in-a-row' in 1982. He also won an 'All Star' that year. However the committee decided to appoint Kevin. The club was very fortunate to be able, once again, to turn to one of its own players from the team which won Junior and Intermediate Championships. Kevin played his early football with Round Towers of Clondalkin and transferred to Naomh Olaf when his family moved to Sandyford. Kevin was a strong defender and captained the side which won the Junior Championship. All those at that game will remember Kevin's victory speech which he delivered totally 'as Gaeilge'. Jack Horgan and Kevin Birrane (Snr) were appointed as team mentors.

In 2003, Naomh Olaf was relegated to Division 2 of the league. It was a time of transition as many of the great players who had served the team so well in the past either departed or retired. Gone were players like Paul Curran, the Valentia Island man who had played really well for many years. Cillian Purcell, Junior Cronin, Alan Lyons, Niall Savage, Niall Coughlan and Robbie Byrne were also gone. On the bright side, new young players, who had come through the club's juvenile ranks, came forward to claim regular places on the team. The Kinsella brothers Eoin, Lorcan and Seamas, Ronan Miley, Eoin Christian, Barry Lynch and Shane Whyte were players upon whom the future of the team would be built. Assistance came from some new signings such as Declan Thornton, Eoin O'Connor and Johnny Tyrrell.

In the league, the team got off to a poor start losing their first four games. After that however, they won six games out of seven and eventually finished comfortably in mid-table. Wins were secured against Whitehall, St Sylvester's, St Finnian's, Naomh Fionnbarra, Craobh Chiaráin, Fingal Ravens and Naomh Barróg. The team showed great form during July and August with Ronan Miley, Niall McCaffrey, Eoin Kinsella and Barry Lynch to the fore in all these games. Indeed, had one or two other league games gone in the team's favour, promotion would have been a real possibility. The league campaign finished with a home game which Naomh Mearnóg won by four points. The result was meaningless to Naomh Olaf, a state of mind which was not to reoccur in future years when final league games were to become hugely important.





In the Championship, Naomh Olaf drew Naomh Fionnbarra. The game was played in May in Parnell Park. This was a wonderful game which finished in a draw. Mick De Veale put in a great performance at left halfback and, at a critical time in the game, went forward to score a vital point. The replay was at the same venue two weeks later. Naomh Olaf began the game well and some excellent points from

Fearghal Purcell had them in control at half time. As the game came to a close, Naomh Fionnbarra drew level. However, the day belonged to the Sandyford team when Cormac Lucey got the winning point on the stroke of full time. Kevin Curtin and his mentors had their first Senior Championship win. In the second round they met O'Tooles. In a lively encounter, O'Tooles proved too strong and won the game by four points.

The team also competed in the AIB and Floodlit Cup competitions. In the Floodlit Cup, they progressed to the semi-final where they lost to Raheny, who were managed by former Naomh Olaf manager Tommy Brennan.

It had been a good year for Kevin Curtin and his team. His side had performed well and consolidated their position in Division 2.

2005

This was arguably the club's most difficult year for football since its foundation. Kevin Curtin and Jack

Horgan were reappointed. Kevin Birrane became manager of the Junior team. The performances of the previous year gave reasonable grounds for optimism that a challenge for promotion was realistic. A win in a cup match, in early March, away to Peregrines by 5 -5 to 0 - 9 reinforced this optimism.

However, once the league began, reality set in quickly. It was not until July 9th that Naomh Olaf won its first league game. Up to then they lost to Fingallians, St Anne's, St Finnian's (Swords), Fingal Ravens, St Maur's, St Oliver Plunkett's, and O'Tooles. The win was away to Parnells by a single point. Unfortunately it was not to trigger the change of fortune which all at Naomh Olaf hoped for. The remaining six league games were all lost to St Sylvester's, Peregrines, Clontarf, Naomh Mearnóg, Garda and Naomh Barróg. Naomh Olaf were firmly anchored to the bottom of the league. The only hope of salvation lay in a once-off relegation play-off.

The rules for the league were, (and still are), that the bottom four teams play off, with the two losers relegated. Fourth from bottom was Peregrines and they played Naomh Olaf who were last. Peregrines' better league position entitled them to a home venue. So Naomh Olaf travelled to Blakestown Road knowing that a win would salvage their senior league status. Peregrines' superior league position and home venue made them favourites. However they had only been promoted from Division 3 the previous year and so lacked the experience of Naomh Olaf at this level. Previous contests indicated that the sides were well matched. They had played twice already this season at the same venue. Peregrines won the league game but Naomh Olaf were victors in the cup encounter.

Naomh Olaf prepared well for the game and Pat Stephens, who had been appointed fulltime club coach, took over team training. This change helped and it was clear that, in the latter part of the season, performances improved despite results. The game itself was a tight affair played in front of a big crowd. Before the start, Naomh Olaf suffered a set back when midfielder Eric Horgan had to leave because his wife Aedin went into labour. The first half saw the sides level on three occasions. At half time, Naomh Olaf led by one point, mainly due to stalwart defending by Cathal Daughton, Paddy Feehan, Niall McCaffrey and Shane Whyte. Up front Fearghal Purcell, Marc Fitzachary, Cormac Lucey and Kevin Birrane kept the score board ticking over. Early in the second half, Naomh Olaf took control and a well worked move ended with a fine goal from Damien Maher. However Peregrines responded with five unanswered points to take a single point advantage. In the final quarter of the game, Brian Begley was introduced at wing back. He made an immediate impact. He won lots of ball and his very accurate passes to the forwards gave Naomh Olaf the edge. Eoin Kinsella, who had been outstanding throughout the game, received a pass close to the sideline about twenty five yards from the Peregrines' goal. Most spectators expected he would try to work the ball closer to goal because to kick a wide at this stage of the game would have been fatal. However, Eoin decided to shoot from a very difficult angle. It was a brave but a great decision. This score is still recalled by Naomh Olaf supporters as one of the best and most important in the club's short history. From the kick-out, Naomh Olaf attacked again and were awarded a free close to goal. Up stepped the man of the moment, Eoin Kinsella, and coolly slotted over the winning score. This was a deserved result for Naomh Olaf and the management team of Kevin and Jack. Both had stuck to their task, never lost faith

in the ability of the team and emerged with senior status for another year. Aedin Horgan gave birth to a boy, Cian. A good day for Naomh Olaf.

In the championship, Naomh Olaf lost to Parnells in the first round.

At the end of the season, Kevin Curtin and Jack Horgan stepped down. The club is indebted to both for their perseverance which ultimately ensured that the club would play senior football in 2006, the club's silver jubilee year.

2006

After the Houdini act of 2005 the club, for the first time, appointed a senior football manager who had no previous involvement in the club. Having considered the appointment carefully, the Club Chairman, John O'Brien, and the Chairman of the Adult Games Committee, Mick De Veale, met with Frank Roebuck. Frank was recommended by Tommy Bren-

nan with whom he had worked on the Dublin Junior team. They also worked together on a Dublin 'Aussie Rules' team. A primary teacher by profession, Frank was a member of Round Towers for whom he had played senior football. He also had experience of senior football management having managed the Towers team. Frank was appointed to the post and at an open meeting was introduced to club members. Kevin Birrane and Mick Whyte were appointed as mentors.

Frank immediately set about reorganising the team and training began. His first match was a challenge game against Inisfails in Balgriffin. Over 30 Olaf players were tried in this game. It was an early opportunity for Frank to assess his new charges. On the night the result (a loss) was unimportant. What was significant was the arrival of the new manager and the appearance of some new players. Brian Rice, Chris Cunningham and Denis O'Driscoll began their Naomh Olaf playing careers. In addition, Frank also had available some new young talent which was emerging from the minor ranks. Donal Kinsella, Declan O'Dwyer and Johnny McGrath would all play a part during the coming season.


The first competitive outing was an AIB Cup game in Ballyogan against Clontarf. In the first half, Clontarf scored two goals but Johnny Tyrrell responded for Naomh Olaf with a well struck shot to the back of the net. At half time, Clontarf led by one point. In the second period, the home side took over. Points from Darragh Maxwell, Kevin Birrane and Brian Rice were memorable. Goals from Fearghal Purcell and Eoin Kinsella (penalty) gave Olaf's a comfortable lead and they finished eleven points clear of their opponents.

Following some more challenge and Cup games, the Adult Football League Division 2 began with a match against St Maur's in Rush. In the warm up before the game, Denis O'Driscoll, who had been selected to play in goal ahead of regular keeper Cathal Daughton, sustained a nasty cut and could not play. Cathal replaced him and had an outstanding game, thus sending a clear message to the new manager that he was not going to easily relinquish his place between the posts. The game itself was a perfect start for the new management team. A good win was secured on the back of fine performances from both established and new players. Paddy Feehan, Derek Dowling, Shane Whyte and team captain Niall McCaffrey gave brilliant displays in defence. Up front Johnny Tyrrell, Chris Cunningham and Donal Kinsella settled in well alongside Eoin Kinsella. The game was notable for a fine display of point scoring by Fearghal Purcell who was on the score sheet four times. The home side struck back in the second half and reduced the lead to a single point. Kevin Birrane settled matters by finishing the scoring with a marvellous point. This victory was the perfect start and gave justifiable grounds for optimism to the Naomh Olaf faithful.

Unlike the previous season Naomh Olaf settled into a very competitive season with fine wins, some draws and the inevitable losses. The drawn game in Ballyogan against O'Tooles was particularly exciting. Despite bad weather conditions, both sides gave top performances. O'Tooles were inspired by Dublin midfielder Eamonn Fennell. In the last minute of the game, Olaf's were leading by one point. O'Tooles attacked and backs and forwards competed for a ball in the Olaf's small square. The referee awarded a free out to Olaf's but goalkeeper Denis O'Driscoll

kett's who eventually went on to win the league. An away win against a team laden with inter- county players was a great achievement for Naomh Olaf. This game was also notable for the emergence of the young players who played a significant role in this victory. Both Donal Kinsella and Johnny McGrath were prominent in the game and good interplay between them led to Kevin Birrane scoring the winning point. The draw with Fingal Ravens is worth noting because this was the year that Ravens went all the way to the All Ireland Intermediate Final. This game was played in Rolestown at a time when both teams were in contention for a place in the promotion playoffs. At half time, the score was level. Fingal Ravens scored the only goal of the half. Eoin Christian and Chris Cunningham contributed well-taken points for Naomh Olaf. In the second half. Naomh Olaf went into a two point lead, thanks to scores from Eoin Kinsella and Fearghal Purcell. However, Ravens were pressing very hard and it took a wonderful save from Cathal Daughton to prevent them scoring their second goal. In the final minute, Ravens scored twice and the the game finished level. This result was not what either team wanted as it damaged both of their promotion ambitions. Nevertheless, it was another wonderful game in what was turning out to a very exciting season.

In the championship, Naomh Olaf came up against the best in Dublin. In the first round, Ballymun Kickhams provided the opposition. Despite a very good performance, Naomh Olaf were beaten. Next up was Naomh Barróg in the 'back door' draw. This was a game both sides wanted to win in order to avoid the relegation championship. Despite points from Johnny Tyrrell, Cormac Lucey, Eoin Kinsella and Fearghal Purcell, Naomh Olaf trailed by two




Niall McCaffrey, a dual star for Naomh Olaf.

mistakenly used the kicking tee, leaving the referee with no choice but to throw in the ball. From the throw in, O'Tooles scored a point to level the match. The kicking tee had only recently been introduced and so the error was understandable. A draw was probably a fair result on the day and supporters were left with yet another talking point.

In the months that followed, Olaf's beat St Oliver Plunkett's, Whitehall, St Jude's (B), St Brigid's (B), and Parnells. The game with Fingal Ravens resulted in a draw. Defeats were inflicted by Raheny, Clontarf, Naomh Mearnóg, Garda, Ballinteer St John's and the season concluded with a defeat to Naomh Barróg. There were highs and lows throughout the season. One of the highs was beating Oliver Plun-

points at half time. The Sandyford men played with purpose in the second half and were quickly back in front. Of particular note in this period was the conversion of a '45' by one of last year's minors, Declan O'Dwyer. The crucial score came late in the game. Donal Kinsella crossed the ball in front of the Naomh Barróg goal. Declan O'Dwyer won the ball and struck it to the back of the net. Naomh Barróg tried desperately to pull the game from the fire but resolute defending from Shane Whyte and Ronan Miley ensured a victory for Naomh Olaf.

In the next round, neighbours Kilmacud Crokes provided the opposition. This team was regarded as the best in Dublin and so it proved, with Crokes winning comfortably. The championship campaign had pitted Naomh Olaf against the strongest opposition in the county but the players showed their ability to compete with the best.

to St Brigid's ground in Blanchardstown for the first Senior Football game on their spectacular new all-weather pitch. The game was played under flood-lights but Naomh Olaf spoiled the party with a late goal to set up a final with St Oliver Plunkett's. The final was again played under lights on the Thomas Davis all-weather pitch. Plunkett's fielded all their inter-county stars (the Brogan brothers, Jason Sherlock etc). After a competitive first half, Naomh Olaf succumbed to Plunkett's class. Once more, in a good season, Naomh Olaf had played against top class opposition but fell marginally short. Nevertheless, to be good enough to get to the business end of competitions showed Naomh Olaf had the players with ability to progress to the next level.

2007

Frank Roebuck was reappointed Team Manager. Kevin Birrane and Mick Whyte were also reappointed as selectors and were joined by John McGrath.

Three new players joined the panel, Cillian Lynch from Co Kerry, Seamus Glynn from Co Mayo and Bernard Gaughran, son of Benny Gaughran who had played for Civil Service in his hayday and Co Louth. These were three experienced players who were destined to make telling contributions over the coming seasons.

The early results were a great disappointment. Defeats were suffered at the hands of St Maur's, O'Tooles, Clontarf, Parnells and Fingallians. Some of these defeats were by narrow margins and a draw with Brigid's followed by a win against St Jude's gave the team some hope that, with a change of luck, they could turn things around. However, as the summer rolled on, further defeats to St Anne's, Naomh Barróg and Raheny deepened the depression. The only respite in this period was a draw with Templeogue Synge Street. With five games remaining in the league, it was clear the relegation play-offs beckoned unless there was a serious turn around. The first sign of light was a draw away to Whitehall. This game was played on a waterlogged pitch and with any luck could have been a victory for Naomh Olaf. In the first half, several clear cut chances for scores were denied by the conditions. On one occasion, Donal Kinsella kicked what looked like a certain goal. However, with the goalkeeper beaten, the ball stopped in a deep puddle of water and failed to cross the line. In the final seconds of the game, with the scores even, Kevin Birrane threw himself at a ball in the penalty area. At full stretch, he punched the ball goalwards only to see his effort hit the upright. The game ended in a draw. Naomh Olaf supporters wondered if the team's luck would ever change but took heart that a run of defeats had been halted.

The next league game was at home to Erin's Isle. This was a very tense affair. Naomh Olaf continued the spirited display they had shown against Whitehall. They never lost touch with their opponents and managed to level the game as the final minute approached. On the stroke of full time the Erin's Isle full back, Gary Connell, caught the ball in front of his own goal. As he attempted to clear the ball, the referee awarded a free against him, apparently for over-carrying. To all observers the free looked harsh. Eoin Kinsella tapped the ball over the bar, the final whistle sounded and Naomh Olaf had a lucky victory. Maybe Lady Luck had decided to support the team at last.

The next outing was away to neighbours Kilmacud Crokes in Silverpark. Both teams were trying to avoid the relegation play-offs. This was another keenly contested game. It was apparent that recent performances had boosted Naomh Olaf confidence. In another close contest, a narrow victory was secured. The game will be particularly remembered for the masterful display of Darragh Maxwell in midfield. Darragh had been injured in the early part of the season. His return to his very best form was one of the main reasons for the Naomh Olaf revival.

Naomh Olaf then faced their other neighbours, Ball-inteer St John's. Both sides needed the points to fight off the prospect of relegation play-offs. Cormac Lucey gave Naomh Olaf the perfect start by scoring a goal in the first minute. For the remainder of the first half, both sides had periods of dominance and at half time Lucey's goal separated the teams. Early in the second half, St John's scored a goal of their

own. The game was now nip and tuck and was all square with five minutes to go. Once again, Darragh Maxwell was involved in the defining moment of the game. His long range speculative shot travelled all the way to the net giving Olaf's a precious lead which they refused to surrender.

The final match was against Fingal Ravens who were in contention for promotion. This was a game from which few would have expected Olaf's to get a result. Mick Deegan's men were on top for long periods of the game but could not pull away from Olaf's. As in many recent games, Naomh Olaf finished well to secure a draw. In this game, the home team had their goalkeeper Cathal Daughton and full back Paddy Feehan to thank for some outstanding defending. This draw was enough to see Naomh Olaf finish above the relegation play-off zone and guarantee senior football for another season.

This year's championship also turned out to be a struggle. In the first round Naomh Olaf were drawn against St Oliver Plunkett's. Sunday afternoon in Parnell Park in front of a big crowd was the setting for this encounter. Naomh Olaf were not overawed by the occasion and put on a sterling performance. Right throughout the game Olaf's players put it up to their more illustrious opponents. Indeed was it not for the class of Jason Sherlock there could have been a shock. Plunkett's won the game by three points, 1 - 19 to 3 - 10. Declan O'Dwyer was outstanding in the half forward line. The team played so well that the struggles that were to follow in the league came as a surprise to Naomh Olaf faithful.

The 'back door' draw pitted Naomh Olaf against Thomas Davis. This seasoned side, with a great championship pedigree, proved far too strong and ran out comfortable winners. Naomh Olaf was now in the relegation championship. They were drawn against Whitehall. This game seemed to offer Naomh Olaf a good chance of victory. The game was played on a very hot Friday evening in Fingallians' ground in Swords at a time when Olaf's were having a torrid time in the league. The championship offered no respite from the poor form and Whitehall inflicted a heavy defeat on the Sandyford men.

When the league finished, Frank Roebuck had to resign his position as team manager for family reasons. However the championship relegation battle was still ongoing and team selection and management was left in the hands of Kevin Birrane, Mick Whyte and John McGrath. They immediately brought in Shane Smith from Thomas Davis to take over team training. In early December, the 'semi-final' of the relegation championship was played against Clontarf in Kiltipper Road, Tallaght. By now, Naomh Olaf form had improved and confidence was high, following good results in the league. However, Clontarf won a very tight game by a single point. In the first half, there was little between the teams. Mick De Veale and Paudi O'Brien defended stoutly. Up front Johnny McGrath, Shane Kelly and Johnny Tyrrell kept Naomh Olaf on terms. Early in the second half, Clontarf scored a goal that was to be crucial to the outcome. Despite several chances, Naomh Olaf could not get the vital late scores to win the game. They now had the dubious honour of qualifying for the relegation final which was postponed until after Christmas.

Immediately after the Christmas break, the team returned to training under Shane Smith. All involved were determined not to surrender Senior Championship status. Their opponents were Garda and the

game was set for a bitterly cold Sunday morning in Newcastle. Naomh Olaf fielded a side which combined youth and experience. Young players like Donal Kinsella, Seamas Kinsella, Johnny McGrath and Simon Hickey were thrust into this important match alongside experienced veterans like Darragh Maxwell, Eric Horgan and Paddy Feehan. Naomh Olaf took the early initiative supported by a strong breeze. Scores from Donal Kinsella, Brian Begley and Johnny McGrath gave the Sandyford team a six point lead at half time. In the second half, Garda, who now had the wind at their backs, brought the game to Naomh Olaf. Gradually they reduced the deficit to a few points. During this phase of the game, the halfback line of Shane Whyte, Barry Lynch and Seamus Glynn were outstanding. With about five minutes to go, a goal from Brian Begley and a point from Si-

mon Hickey broke the Garda resolve and Olaf's won the game and remained in the Senior Championship.

2008

JJ Martin was appointed team manager for 2008. He had been a tremendous player in his day. He played inter-county football for Cavan and was the cornerstone of the great Thomas Davis team of the 80s and 90s. For the past few years he had been Senior Team Manager in Newtownmountkennedy, Co Wicklow. Kevin Birrane and John McGrath were reappointed as selectors.

After the survival heroics of 2008, the new season beckoned with high hopes under the new manager. New players to join the panel were David Burke and

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Fergal McCann, both formerly of Salthill Knocknacarra. In addition, the club welcomed the return of Ronan Hegarty. Ronan had played under age with the club and progressed through Minor and Under 21 to play at Senior level. He then went to work in Donegal and played his club football there. In 2008, Ronan returned to work in Dublin and transferred back to Naomh Olaf.

The season got off to a good start with two wins from the first three games. After losing the opening fixture to Templeogue Synge Street, a great two points were secured away to St Mary's Saggart. A second away win was achieved against Naomh Fionnbarra. These two games contrasted the young and the old for the team. The victory over St Mary's was noteworthy for the outstanding performance of minor goalkeeper Denis Kelleher. However, against Naomh Fionnbarra it was Derek Dowling and Mick De Veale who stood out. They were both back in the Senior Team because of injuries and absentees. Both showed their

experience and strength in a tough encounter. The game was won in the final seconds by Eoin Kinsella who scored the winning point from a fifty yard free.


However these games were followed by a series of disappointing defeats. Particularly disappointing were the losses to Kilmacud Crokes where a substantial half time lead was surrendered and Whitehall, a game where Olaf's kicked a serious number of wides. Two points were secured away to Parnells and an excellent draw was taken from a trip to Skerries. However with four games remaining, the spectre of the relegation play-offs loomed once again. With only seven points secured, surely it was too much to expect the team to repeat the heroics of 2007.

The first of these games was played against St Brigid's in Blanchardstown on their all-weather pitch. Outstanding performances from Ronan Hegarty, Marc Fitzachary and the Kinsella brothers, Eoin and Donal, contributed to a much needed win. The next league fixture was at home to Clontarf who were also fighting to avoid the play-offs. This was seen by both clubs as a four pointer. Once again the Naomh Olaf players excelled and the win was secured. On this occasion, it was a series of brilliant saves and blocks by goalkeeper Cathal Daughton and full back Paddy Feehan which inspired the victory. Next up was a home game against neighbours Ballinteer St John's. They were having a good season and were pressing for a promotion play-off place. The game ended in a draw. It took a long range free from Johnny McNally to deny Naomh Olaf the victory. This gave the team twelve points but results elsewhere meant that they needed to win the final game against Erin's Isle. This was played in Finglas and Naomh Olaf once more had to show their determination to secure a single point win. This game once again showed the quality of the defence with Shane Whyte and David Burke outstanding in the half back line. Brian Begley scored some vital points and Eoin Kinsella finished a brilliant run to the net to score the all important goal.

When the league finished, it showed Naomh Olaf well clear of the relegation play- offs. Eventually Naomh Fionnbarra and Clontarf were relegated to the third division. What was notable about the tally of fourteen league points was that only three were secured at home.

The senior championship was again a struggle. Naomh Olaf finished last in a group which also contained Kilmacud Crokes, Raheny and O'Tooles. Kilmacud Crokes went on to win the Dublin and All Ireland club titles.

The first round of the relegation championship was played in O'Toole Park against St Anne's. Naomh Olaf took a heavy beating. After this game, mentors and players reappraised their approach to all aspects of the team. Training was stepped up. Shane Smith was brought back to take training. Players and mentors showed a new determination to retain both league and championship status. In the next round, Naomh Olaf were drawn against Naomh Barróg. This game was played in Saggart. At the end of a tough game, Naomh Olaf were winners by one point. There were some fine performances on the night but once again it was the defence that was outstanding. Eric Horgan used all his experience to guide the side to victory. Up front Fergal McCann and Marc Fitzachary were always a thorn in the side of the opposition. Naomh Barróg were eventually relegated to Intermediate Championship.

The highlight of the year was probably when Naomh Olaf bridged a nine year gap and won the AIB Cup. The final was played in Wedgewood against neighbours Kilmacud Crokes. This final was a carry over from the previous year's competition. The team included some veterans of the 1999 winning side -Paddy Feehan, Eric Horgan, Darragh Maxwell and Cathal Daughton. Naomh Olaf started brightly with points from Fearghal Purcell and Simon Hickey. Naomh Olaf led at half time 1 - 06 to 0 - 08 thanks to a well taken goal by Fergal McCann. In the second half, Naomh Olaf quickly went into a five point lead mainly due to great play from Conor Sobolewski. Further scores from Shane Whyte and Eoin Christian ensured Naomh Olaf ran out comfortable winners.

A year which began with great promise ended with Naomh Olaf comfortably in mid table. Once again the league format which involves the bottom four teams in a relegation play-off caused anxiety. Once

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more Naomh Olaf showed their talent and resilience to ensure the worry of a play-off was avoided.

JJ Martin and John McGrath resigned from team management at the end of the season. Player of the Year went to Eoin Kinsella who led the forward line brilliantly and consistently came up with vital scores when needed.

2009

2009 saw the appointment of former Armagh footballer Des Mackin as team manager. Paddy Feehan, a legend of Naomh Olaf football, opted for the sideline and became a mentor. They were joined by the experienced Kevin Birrane.

Paddy felt he could best contribute to the team from the sideline. His view was not universally shared by Naomh Olaf supporters, many of whom thought he still had a lot to offer on the field. Indeed, as the season progressed, Paddy did play a few games.

Des immediately introduced new methods of training and preparation which were embraced by the players. In January the attendance at early morning training on Killiney Hill was almost 100%.

The league campaign got off to a slow start. The first game away to Templeogue Synge Street was lost, despite a good performance. The players were working hard to adapt to a new style of play which required high levels of fitness and placed an emphasis on ball retention. The first victory came in an away game to St Mark's. It seemed that the team still found it easier to win away from home. The next points were secured from a win against St Maur's, a home win at last. This was a particularly good win as it was against a team which had been unbeaten up to that point. What was even more pleasing was that it was followed up by a great performance at home

against St Anne's who only secured a draw with a point in the fourth minute of injury time. This was the same St Anne's team that inflicted very heavy defeats on Naomh Olaf the previous year in both league and championship.

However as the wet summer rolled on, heavy defeats were inflicted by Round Towers, St Brigid's and Parnells. Tight battles with O'Tooles and Ballinteer St John's were also lost. The prospect of the relegation play-offs began to loom large. In September a good away win was secured against Cuala. This was followed by a very narrow defeat to Whitehall. The way the league was shaping up, it was imperative that Naomh Olaf won their last two games to have any chance of avoiding the relegation playoffs. Skerries were next up. Due to bad weather in early December which made the Sandyford pitches unplayable, the game was set for Ballyogan. On the morning of the match, Naomh Olaf and the referee waited for the Skerries team. Thirty minutes after the scheduled throw-in, all of the Skerries team had not arrived. The referee departed and his report to the county committee recommended that the game be awarded to Naomh Olaf.

This brought us to what was scheduled to be the final league match against St Patrick's Palmerstown. This young and mobile team had been promoted from Division 3 but also found themselves in need of points. In a tight and dogged game, Naomh Olaf secured a narrow victory. There were some great performances by Naomh Olaf players but none more than team captain Kevin Birrane who played brilliantly on St Pat's talisman and Dublin hurling star, Liam Rushe. This result left Naomh Olaf outside the bottom four on scoring difference. The team and supporters retired to the clubhouse to celebrate another important

victory and looked forward to a well-earned Christmas break.

However the celebrations were short lived as Templeogue Synge Street objected. They stated that the use of score difference was invalid as Naomh Olaf had received a walk-over against Skerries. The objection was upheld which meant there would be a four way play-off to determine the team to finish fourth from bottom. Eventually it was decided that the game between Skerries and Naomh Olaf, which was originally a walk-over for Naomh Olaf, should be played after Christmas. This was very disappointing as the team had to prepare for a vital game during the Christmas holidays. When the game was played, Naomh Olaf were comfortable winners. On the same day, St Mark's beat St Pat's and so the playoffs involved Ballinteer St John's, St Pat's, O'Tooles and Whitehall, with the latter two being eventually relegated.

The Championship was a huge disappointment. The first round was against Kilmacud Crokes who, as expected, were easy winners. In the 'back door' game, O'Tooles inflicted another defeat. The first round of the relegation championship was against Whitehall. This offered Naomh Olaf the best prospect of a win as Whitehall were also having a bad year. The game was played in Blanchardstown but a very disappointing display by Olaf's allowed Whitehall to secure their senior championship status. Next up was the formidable Division 1 side, Fingal Ravens. In a tight game in Balgriffin, Ravens won and Naomh Olaf were once again consigned to the relegation play-off final. This time there was not to be a happy ending. Templeogue Synge Street inflicted a heavy defeat and Naomh Olaf were relegated to Intermediate championship. It was a disappointing end to

the season. Having avoided relegation for so many years, it was inevitable that so many titanic battles would catch up with the team.

Opening of Páirc Uí Bhriain

This article by Thomas Brown was published in Panorama in November 2003

On Saturday October 25th 2003, the club held an event which formally named the new pitches after recently deceased member Barry O'Brien. As most people know, Barry was a club member who gave outstanding service to his club, his college team (University of Limerick) and to his county. Barry captained the Dublin U21 side last summer shortly after his father John, the club treasurer at the time, passed away.

As a fitting tribute, the council granted permission for the new pitches to be named after Barry. A beautiful stone was unveiled at the ceremony, by Barry's mother, Brenda, and brother, David, and it sits at the entrance to the pitches, on the clubhouse side of the fence.

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2005 Dublin Minor B Hurling Championship Winners - By Brendan McGlynn Jnr.

2005 proved to be a very successful year for the Naomh Olaf minor hurling team, culminating in a historic win over Crumlin, in an epic county final played in O'Toole Park. The championship campaign began with an encouraging win away to St Jude's in Tymon Park. Next up in the quarter-final was a trip to Malahide to play St Sylvester's. The match was played in ideal conditions for hurling, on an excellent sod for the time of year, with Naomh Olaf winning by four points. In the semi-final, we were drawn away for the third time against Whitehall Colmcille. Whitehall had beaten us at the same stage by one point in Wedgewood the previous year. This draw gave the lads an ideal opportunity to exact revenge for that defeat. The match itself turned out to be a very tense and physical affair between two evenly matched teams with Naomh Olaf finally coming out on top in an enthralling finish by one point. Whitehall were controversially awarded a 21 yard free with the last puck of the game. The free was well struck but a combination of bodies managed to block it out and seal a dramatic win for Olaf's.

The final was played on the 4th December in O'Toole Park against Crumlin. Crumlin started brightly and scored the opening point of the game. Our nerves were soon settled when Johnny McGrath scored an excellent point from play. Crumlin however responded well and began to dominate possession, aided by a strong breeze. Niall Brogan and Darren Whelan were causing problems in our defence, picking off a number of good scores from play. We managed to stay in touch with Crumlin, thanks largely to

the efforts of Simon Hickey. Simon's strong direct running at the heart of the Crumlin defence resulted in three frees which were all converted by the ever reliable Donal Kinsella. Crumlin enjoyed a purple patch just before half time, scoring 1-3 without reply to leave the half time score 1-7 to 0-4.

Although trailing by six points at half time, the mood in the Olaf's dressing room was positive. This group of players had been playing together since U10, under the management of Fin Máirtín, Fran O'Dwyer and trained in later years by Barry O'Brien. As well as their hurling skills, a great team bond had been developed over the years, resulting in a 'never say die' attitude within the team. Leaving the dressing room for the second half, nobody was in any doubt that we would respond to the challenge thrown down by Crumlin.

Slowly but surely, Olaf's began to get a strangle-hold on the game. In defence, Stevie Mahon, Declan O'Dwyer and Fearghal Máirtín were hurling out of their skins. Crumlin, however, offered stubborn resistance to the Olaf's fightback and still lead by 4 points with around fifteen minutes remaining. The crucial score for Olaf's came following brilliant team work. Simon Hickey battled for primary possession from a long Ian Whelan puck out, with Donal Kinsella winning the breaking ball. Donal showed great vision and accuracy to pick out Declan O'Dwyer with a 40 yard cross field pass. Deco gathered possession in midfield in yards of space. Instead of carrying the ball forward himself, he delivered a typically unselfish low fast ball into Johnny McGrath's

corner. Johnny anticipated the pass coming and got out in front of the defender. After gathering possession, Johnny escaped the attention of two Crumlin men before finishing to the net. The goal still left us a point down but the momentum was now with Olaf's. Two inspirational frees from Donal Kinsella from within his own half edged Olaf's in front, for the first time in the match. Further points from play by Simon Hickey and Johnny McGrath, following good work from Stevie Mahon and Chrissy Fennell, sealed a superb fightback from Olaf's and a historic first Minor Hurling Championship for the club.

2006 Dublin Under 21 B Hurling Championship Winners - By Brendan McGlynn Jnr.

Having won the Dublin Minor B Championship in 2005, Naomh Olaf were optimistic, heading into the Under 21 Championship in 2006. The panel, consisting of the successful minors of the previous year, was further bolstered by Dara Hayes, Anthony Daly, Richie McDonnell, Seamas Kinsella and Francie Grey. We began the campaign well with a convincing victory away to Naomh Fionnbarra. In the semifinal, we were made to fight all the way by a very determined Naomh Mearnóg side in Wedgewood. Indeed, going into the final quarter of the game, the Portmarnock men held a four point advantage and it took a plucky fight-back by Naomh Olaf to advance to the county final on a score line of 3-7 to 1-11.

Our opponents in the final were Raheny with the game being played in O'Toole Park on the 1st December. Played on a heavy pitch, this final provided plenty of excitement with the outcome in the balance until the final minute. The difficult underfoot conditions militated against flowing hurling and required the total concentration of the players from start to finish.

Despite starting the game without injury victims Declan O'Dywer and Chrissy Fennell, we settled quickly into the game with our first score coming from a Donal Kinsella free. While Raheny drew level one minute later, their tendency to commit fouls was punished on a day that scoring from play was proving extremely difficult. A great score from play, along with two frees from Donal Kinsella, pushed Olafs into an early lead. Raheny responded bravely however with a scrambled goal but another con-

verted free from Donal and a point from play from Johnny McGrath meant that at half time we led by 0-7 to 1-2.

The second half was a tight affair with Olafs still holding the upper hand. Anthony Daly held the defence together from centre back, alongside the magnificent Feargal Máirtín whose calming influence insured that a very disciplined defence did not concede any unnecessary frees to the opposition. The immense work rate of Richie McDonnell, Josh Dunford, Seamas Kinsella and Dara Hayes, along with the precise finishing from frees from Donal Kinsella, gave us a three point lead heading into the final minute of normal time. Disaster then struck when Raheny equalized with a second scrappy goal and the game seemed destined for extra time. However the experience gained from a narrow Minor Final victory in 2005 stood to Olafs in the final tense minutes. We remained calm and focused and our collective nerve was rewarded when Donal Kinsella scored a dramatic winning goal three minutes into injury time with the final score 1-10 to 2-4. The win was just reward for a very talented and dedicated group of young hurlers who had all applied themselves brilliantly in training during the year.

How often have you heard the phrase, "Who would want to be a Referee?" Like the committed players that every successful team needs, the referee, who is necessary before any game can proceed, is a dedicated individual who, for his own reasons, takes the whistle in hand to officiate at our games. Referees for the most part are either current or ex-players. No two individuals are alike. Most people will differ in their views of incidents that occur during the course of a game. Every one of us can recall incidents in games that when related would have been viewed differently by someone else who had seen the same incident. One should remember that the referee has only one pair of eyes (some will say that they are all blind) and that he

may on occasions not see a particular foul from the same vantage point as spectators or mentors. It is very easy to have one's line of vision obstructed by a player running across your line of sight. Unfortunately, the referee has only the one view on which he has to make an instant decision based on what he has seen. Hindsight is a wonderful thing.

It is very easy to be critical of referees. It always amazes me how the referee is the first to be blamed when a team loses a game. The referee on these occasions is a soft target. All referees are honest in their approach to every game. They will always attempt to be fair in every decision they make. It is easy to maintain control of thirty individuals who want to play but not so when there are some who are out for mischief during the course of any game. Some referees are better at this than others, remember no referee can foresee a foul or the consequences but has to deal with aftermath.

December 2007 - Automated External Defibrillator (AED)

At a ceremony in the school, principal, Mr Seán Mulvihill, in the presence of the teaching staff, accepted the defibrillator on behalf of St Benildus College.

Naomh Olaf GAA Club has a long and proud association with the school and uses the college grounds for its juvenile games. Significantly, many of its players and mentors, past and present, are or were pupils of the school and as such, the bond between club and school is strong.

In a short address to the assembled staff, Paul Sullivan said that Naomh Olaf GAA Club was delighted to present St Benildus College with the AED. He thanked them for their on-going support of Naomh Olaf GAA Club, both on and off the pitch, and hoped that this would continue in the future. Seán Mulvihill said that he was delighted to accept the AED on behalf of the school and thanked Naomh Olaf for its gesture. He said that it was important that the school possessed an AED and it was poignant that Cormac McAnallen, a gifted GAA footballer, was also a young and popular teacher in St Benildus College before his death from sudden cardiac arrest in 2004. It was largely due to the death of Cormac that the Irish public became aware of the issue of sudden cardiac death among young people.

The Club Coach - By Darren Egan

In 2004, the club made a courageous and far-seeing decision to employ a full time Games Promotion Officer, also known as a Club Coach. The reason for this decision is discussed elsewhere in this book. The club was fortunate to secure the services of Pat Stephens, a man who had a very high profile. Pat, a native of Galway, was living in Dublin whilst completing a Masters in Exercise Physiology in UCD. Pat also had a degree in Sports Science from University of Limerick. For many years, Pat had been involved in coaching Dublin-based intercounty players from other counties. He had also worked on the TG4 reality TV show 'The Underdogs', as a fitness and strength coach. While Pat was the club's first full-time coach, the club has continued to employ one, and at times two, full-time coaches as well as suitably qualified part-time people to fill this role.

Pat, who commenced work in his new post in November 2004, had the privilege of having the use of the Naomh Olaf Club car sponsored by Paschal Kennedy Motors, Dún Laoghaire. Pat did outstanding work for the club and, indeed, laid much of the groundwork for today's club. In 2005, Pat was joined by Chris Cunningham as a second full-time coach. The Co. Meath man's main task was as a primary schools' hurling coach. Pat was very popular around the club and the children missed him when he left his post, to take up a job in the secondary school sector. The children need not have worried as the Offaly man Austen Lynch took up the post.

Austen furthered the work already done and provided a boost to the club with his new ideas. He was in the role for two years when he decided to return to college to take up another field of work. Austen was

very popular around the schools in the area and is still held in high regard in the primary schools today.

In September 2009, the club was delighted to employ for the first time one of its own club members. Darren Egan, who lives in Wedgwood and who has played hurling and football for the club since he was a child (and is still playing with the club), was given the position of Club Coach, which he retains today. In September 2010, it was decided to split the role of Club Coach. This involved one coach concentrating on the school side of coaching and the second coach being responsible for coaching within the club.

Club member Johnny McGrath, Balally Drive, has also been playing with the club since he was a child. As a talented hurler and footballer, his appointment also proved to be a great success. He was highly thought of in the schools by the students and teachers alike. It was due to his experience in this role that Johnny decided to return to college to start a course in primary school teaching.

The post is now filled by Aisling Farrelly. Aisling was a member of the Dublin panel that won the All-Ireland in 2010 and has previously worked as a Games Promotion Officer in Templeogue/Synge Street. Aisling is proving to be very popular with the students around the schools in the area. With Aisling's experience and innovative ideas, the club can look to greater progress in the development of our young players.

When discussing coaching in the club, one cannot omit Andy Gibbons. Andy worked for many years in the schools as the club's hurling coach. He is still present in the club and at schools functions and is highly regarded by coaches, teachers and children. Like all previous coaches, he is very welcome back to the club at any time.

Schools

The Club Coach works closely with the schools in the area. It is one of the aims of the Club Coach to get the maximum number of children from each school down to Naomh Olaf to join the teams. This is done through coaching of the children during class time. The coach targets classes at the lower age groups, particularly senior infants up to third class. This is done for two reasons. The first is to catch the children's attention to Gaelic games from as young an age as possible. Secondly, it also gives children, who may not have an interest in GAA, a taste of it as once a child goes into fourth class, many children experience the Cumann na mBunscol competition. The club prides itself on its close relations with the schools in the area. Currently, we are present in seven schools from Our Lady of the Wayside, Kilternan down to Holy Cross, Dundrum. Each school receives at least one and a half hours coaching a week. We value our relationship with each school as we think that the schools are vital to player recruitment and it is of strategic importance that a presence is maintained in each school.

Competitions

The Club Coach organises a number of tournaments for different groups in the club. During the school year, we have a minimum of seven school tournaments for classes from second class up to sixth class. Many players, who have since left primary school, remember playing in the Andy Gibbons Hurling Tournament for third class students, which is refereed by Andy Gibbons. For many years, the Club Coach has organised a Mini All-Ireland Competi-

tion. This is for players in the club aged 8 to 11. In 2010 to meet demand, an older Mini All- Ireland was also organised for players from 12 to 15. This competition is held in late summer and is seen as a nice return to pre-season training for our players.

Academy

A vital aspect of the role of Club Coach is the academy. The academy caters for children aged 5 to 7. It is here that the foundation stones for the years to come are laid. At the academy, we target to teach the skills of the games as well as the rules in an organised way but also, most importantly, in a fun way. We aim to see a progression in every child from when they enter the academy to when they leave it to play at the Under 8 age group. With the growing numbers involved with the ladies' section of the club, it was decided to split the academy to have a 'girls only' academy. This is held on a Friday night and has gone from strength to strength and now totals over sixty girls of different ages.

The Future

The existence of the Club Coach role is vital for the continued progress for the club.

From Shoelaces to College Places - By Anthony Delaney

When mentors take a team out of the academy, little do they know the journey that lies ahead. The journey from U8 through minor is a long one; 10 years working with a group of kids, seeing them develop their skills and watching them grow from small children to young adults.

As Declan Coppinger, who became the mentor of the U8s in 1999, explained to new mentors last year, it's the journey 'from shoelaces to college places'. You start out tying shoelaces for a tiny eager-faced young kid and progress to discussing college places with the same 6' 2" young man. Like all mentors, Declan experienced a mix of highs and lows over those ten years but as any mentor will tell you, the highs far outweigh the lows.

Successful Juvenile Years

Over the early years, Declan built his mentor team, including John Garvey and Anthony Delaney, and the many hours perfecting skills on the training ground outside the clubhouse paid off when they picked up the U11 Hanrahan Shield in O'Toole Park on a sunny June morning in 2002. A panel of twenty battled well and claimed a hard fought victory for what was to be the first of many pieces of silverware that the team brought back to the club

Only a year later, they picked up the 2003 U12 South Dublin plate in Parnell Park thanks to fine performances from Thomas Downes, Colin Kyne Delaney, Blaine Begley and Cian Faulkner. These were all names that would figure prominently in the

following years. Indeed, one of the stars on that day was a big fullback called Conor Haskins, who would make his mark in later years in midfield and who you will now see playing for the club's adult intermediate team.

In 2005, a hurling team was formed and within a few months they finished runners-up in the U14 Féile Division 5, losing a close final in Parnell Park to St Finian's. The Féile competition highlighted the potential for this team and the following year they captured the U15 Division 4 title with an emphatic 8-14 to 3-0 win over Clontarf.

Progression into Adult Games

In 2007, the mentors took the bold step to take the team past U16s and straight into minor football to ensure the club had sufficient numbers to enter a team at minor level. It was a step that many ques-

tioned, but it provided the first minor football team for the club in 4 years. Declan's team joined up with Jerry Kelleher's team for the next two years and it provided the basis of a new generation of players for the adult section. That combined minor team produced players of the calibre of Conor Haskins, Colin Doyle, Denis Kelleher, Cian Faulkner and David Lynch in football and Colin Kyne Delaney, Cillian Lewins, Shane Mulvey and Ian Harding in hurling.

When Declan finished with his team at the end of minors, he had, like so many mentors who have managed a group for so long, developed a strong relationship with the players. It's a relationship that will live on for many years, as this group of young men will always be the U8s of 1999, and the minors of 2007 and 2008.

Recall - By Paddy Kiernan

One of the great gifts that we all have is the ability to look back, reflect and recall various happenings and occurrences from our involvements in the GAA family. This is a special privilege when one meets up with past or present colleagues and a discussion develops.

We can all recall various events, be it on a playing field, from matches we attended or at the cold face of administration within clubs with which we were lucky to be involved. It also is great to discuss these occasions with colleagues and friends, as each of us will have our own memories of events that happened on a particular occasion at which we were fortune enough to be present.

Everybody recalls the paper headlines that journalists produce from all the major championship and league matches played throughout the length and breadth of the country. They, however, are the words of someone else whereas our own descriptions are something completely different.

I would like to share some of my own memories and recollections of over 40 years involvement with the GAA. I'm from Drumlish in Co. Longford, a small village just north of Longford town. My first memories of being part of the GAA was playing football in the local national school and then for the local minor club St Vincent's at school boy level and up through the ages of 14, 16 and Minor. In those early days, the club developments that we see to-day of dressing rooms, enclosed pitches and floodlit grounds were not present. I can remember having to go down to the local field and tog out along the side of ditches. Our club was somewhat successful

at under age level, winning both a Minor and Under 16 championship in 1972.

I was also fortunate enough to be part of the county teams playing Under 16 for Longford in a competition called 'The Father Manning Cup' and then also playing for Longford at Minor level in Leinster Championship Competition. I was part of the Minor squad for two years running in '73 and '74.

In 1974, Longford played three games in the Minor championships (straight knockout basis); first up was Kildare at home, and next up was Dublin in the semi-final and then the final against Wicklow which we lost. I played at left corner-back in all three games. I can say, however, that I was present to see the start of the revival of Dublin's fortune in 1974 where Dublin went on to contest, and win, the Leinster and All- Ireland Finals. Indeed, one could say that was the revival of the present colourful Hill and the fabulous atmosphere that Dublin supporters bring to Croke Park.

In my earlier years, I was also lucky enough to be involved in college football, playing in the Leinster Colleges Championship. I had the privilege of playing on the same college team as Richie Connor, who went on to captain the Offaly team that won the All-Ireland in 1982, preventing Kerry achieving that famous five in a row.

Having finished up in school, I moved to Dublin to work but continued to play football with my home club in Longford. In 1975, I sustained a bad injury where I did serious damage to my left knee, which required surgery, and kept me out of football for almost a year. Having returned from injury, I was still

troubled by my knee and was not able to play to the same level as I had before.

Obviously living in Dublin and commuting home was difficult, especially in those early years, as I did not have my own transport. While reading the Evening Herald, I stumbled across a notice from Coiste na Réiteoirí looking for new referees. I knew this was a way of maintaining my involvement in the GAA. I applied and thus commenced my career as a club referee in Dublin. This was in the early eighties and, apart from two serious injuries sustained, I have been refereeing ever since.

My refereeing career commenced with an-in house training course at 5 Belvedere Square, where the Dublin County Board was located at that time. Meetings were held in the basement of the County Board Offices where we were given instruction in the rules etc. necessary to provide us with the knowledge to commence our refereeing careers. But as we all know, nothing beats experience and it is only from experience that I learned how to deal with various situations and occurrences on the playing fields.

The first game I was appointed to referee was under the Junior Football Board in the Phoenix Park. The game involved Park Rangers and was played on the 40 Acres. I can recall how nervous I was taking charge of my first game, whether I would have the knowledge to be able to take charge of the 30 players. I have no doubt too that the seasoned players could see how nervous I was, but I survived, held my nerve and was now up and running as a budding referee.

My memories of this period of time was the difficulty in finding the various locations where I was appointed to officiate as I was not familiar with the

Dublin GAA scene and most of the venues were a total mystery to me. I was lucky enough to meet great colleagues who were able to put me on the right road. Having commenced my refereeing career, I harboured the thoughts of reaching the highest level possible. This was done by, firstly, attaining this at County Level and then being fortunate to go on to the Inter County scene. For me, however the Inter County Scene was not attainable as a referee but I was fortunate enough to be involved as an official on the Inter County scene for at least ten years.

My refereeing career in Dublin progressed nicely and I had the honour of officiating at a number of finals within the Dublin county. These included the following:

- Minor Football Championship
- Under 21 Football Final
- County Senior Final in 1998 involving Kilmacud Crokes and Na Fianna.

I can still remember the day I was notified that I had been appointed to referee the County Senior Football Final in Dublin. I was notified about a week and a half prior to the game by the secretary of Coiste na Réiteoirí. He advised me that I had to organise my team of umpires for the day, but that the Coiste on this occasion had appointed the lines men to assist me. The week leading up to the game is still crystal clear in my mind and the thoughts that went through my head, the worries, the anxieties and the fear that maybe I might pick up an injury or fall ill and be unable to participate on the day in question. I suppose you can put this down to nervous energy upon the excitement of the appointment. The fact that the game was to be televised on TG4 who had just commenced showing county finals did not help my case. I still have a video of the game in question.

I consider this as the height of my refereeing career to date in Dublin. The fact that I was appointed by my peers to officiate at the Senior Final is, to me, acknowledgement of my abilities to control a game and implement the rules.

I was also fortunate enough to be involved on the Inter County scene operating as an umpire for over 10 years. This came about through my friend and colleague, Aodán Mac Suibhne, who commenced refereeing in Dublin about one year earlier than me. Aodán was a hurling referee and was appointed by the Dublin Committee to the Inter County scene for hurling. Aodán was also responsible for me taking up refereeing hurling in Dublin, due to the shortage at that time. It is fair to say that I was reluctant to do so, but I did and the rest is history.

One of my first assignments with Aodán was at an Under 16 Special Hurling League match in Wicklow between Wicklow and Meath. This would have happened in the early 90s. Aodán continued to referee at Inter County Level until he retired in 2005.

During Aodán's time as an Inter County referee, I would have assisted him on at least 80-85% of the occasions that he refereed at Inter County Level. We were lucky that we officiated at almost every hurling county throughout Ireland.

Aodán had a distinguished career at Inter County Level and was good enough to referee at all of the major hurling finals including, in 1994 the Minor All-Ireland Hurling Final, in 2001 the Under 21 All Ireland Hurling Final and in 2002 and 2004 the All-Ireland Senior Hurling Final. To be part of the team of officials on the occasion of an All-Ireland Final was something special, no matter what the grade. I have fond memories of my involvement on these oc-

casions. Looking back on these occasions, I recall the All-Ireland Minor Final of 1994 was memorable for the fact that Offaly staged such a recovery against Limerick, scoring three goals in the final minutes to practically steal the title. After our game ,we were given seats along the sidelines and in front of the Hogan Stand. Croke Park had not been revamped at this stage.

The All-Ireland Senior Finals of 2002 and 2004 were special days. Indeed the excitement and contention commenced once Aodán was advised that he had been appointed as referee and contacted each of us to confirm our availability to assist on the day.

In 2002, I happened to be away on holidays when he was notified and I received a text seeing if I was free on that Sunday. I indeed made myself available without hesitation and told him promptly of such. The day itself was something else, arriving at Croke Park, passing through the security clearance into the dressing rooms. Croke Park had been revamped and the referees' dressing room were now located under the Cusack Stand. They are fine spacious rooms and on arrival there were refreshments

aplenty contained therein. The Minor Final referee and the Senior Final referee have their own dressing rooms for themselves and their umpires, linesmen and fourth official. The sense of anticipation on taking the field, the fullness of the arena, the crowd, and the whole occasion was overwhelming. Our nerves on edge, as there is so much focus on the referee and his officials and the decisions they make. We were all conscious of how each aspect of the game is viewed by the watching critics and analysts, praying that we would not make any silly or stupid calls to bring us to their attention. 2002 was also remarkable as referees were now being appointed to officiate outside of their province. In this year we were also selected to officiate at the Munster Final in Cork. Many hurling purists regard this as most difficult of all the provincial championships to win. In hurling terms, it is up there with the All-Ireland Final. The atmosphere in Cork that day was electric, hair standing on the back of the neck stuff, Waterford v Tipperary. We travelled that day by train and I still remember meeting club members on the return trip and chatting about the game.

In 2002, we were requested to form part of the umpiring team for the International Rules Series between Ireland and Australia. Part of this involved us being wired to the match referees. This was new technology to us. We could, for the first time, overhear all that was being said by the referees to the players on the field of play. My abiding memory of this International Rules Series was the perishing cold on the day of the second test in Croke Park.

Finally, in the last few years, the final chapter of my refereeing career came about when I got involved

Finbarr O'Driscoll of Naomh Olaf GAA Club refereed three Ladies Football All-Ireland Finals in Croke Park between 1997 and 2000, two at senior level and one at junior level. In the 1997 Senior Final between Waterford and Monaghan, Finbarr played 11 minutes and 4 seconds of injury time at the end of the second half, after which Monaghan emerged victorious by two points.

In 1998, the Ladies Gaelic Football Association decided to introduce the Countdown Clock with a view to eliminating the timing controversy that surrounded the previous year's final. Finbarr was selected to operate the clock in Croke Park for the senior final between Waterford and Monaghan. The game ended in a draw and Waterford won the replay. Referee Christy Haughney played 12 minutes and 30 seconds injury time in the second half of the replay and so the 11 minutes and 4 seconds slipped into the background. However, to this day, it is still the one that is remembered. In 1999, Finbarr was put

in charge of the Waterford and Mayo Senior Final which Mayo won. Diane O'Hora, Mayo's captain, was the last person to receive a trophy in the 'old' Hogan Stand as the demolition work began the following morning.


In 2000, Finbarr refereed his last All-Ireland Final. It was the junior final between Down and Galway which Down won. He also had the honour of refereeing two Senior National League Finals, two All-Star matches, two interprovincial tournament finals and four O'Connor Cup (Colleges) finals in a row, 1997 – 2000. He refereed in twenty-two different counties as well as in London and Manchester. He was given the honour of taking charge of the All-Ireland Senior 7-a-side tournament final between Emyvale, Monaghan and Shelmaliers, Wexford in 2006 for his final game in charge as an inter-county referee. Emyvale won the competition.



Lá na gClub - By Brendan McGlynn

To mark the 125th anniversary of the GAA, Sunday May 10th 2009 was designated as Lá na gClub. The day was set aside for club activity only. There were no Inter-County or Inter-Club games, and every club was expected to organise its own special programme of events.

Naomh Olaf celebrated the occasion in great style. There was a big turnout from all sections of the club. The beautiful weather was a welcome bonus, allowing all field activities to take place as planned. The formal ceremonies commenced with the blessing of the club by our local parish priest, Monsignor Dermot Lane.

Then the Club Chairman, Pól Ó Súilleabháin, addressed the gathering as follows:

"Little did the men who formed the GAA in Thurles 125 years ago realise the legacy of their actions when they set up the Gaelic Athletic Association. 125 years later, the largest amateur sporting organisation in the world stands testament to their vision, drive and ambition.

Around the same period, rugby, soccer, baseball, Australian Rules football and a number of other sporting codes were constituted – and while all are fine sports in their own way – all have become professional. The GAA has not. It has held true to the pillars of amateurism and volunteerism.

The strength of the Association is not bricks and mortar; it is not fields and posts. It is flesh and blood, bones and muscles, held together by pride of place, passion, perseverance and the proud assertion that the games we play are not just the greatest games in the world – but a statement of who we are, where we

come from and where we want to go.

The key word in the GAA is Association. It embodies the belief that within a defined area or parish, everyone is welcome to participate and take part. Young, old, rich, poor – everyone is welcome to join.

We set no barriers; we erect no prejudices. However, one thing is certain, you will be asked in some small way to do something – anything. It is that participation that creates the bond, strengthens spirits and shares burdens and defeats – but allows all of us to gain from the experience. The modern phrase is 'Community'; the better understood Irish phrase is 'Meitheal'.

28 years ago, with nothing but 'Meitheal' in mind, a group of individuals led by Dubs and culchies founded Naomh Olaf. They had nothing - no pitches, no jerseys and no clubhouse. It was established in the middle of a recession but building on the core values of the GAA. It has grown to be a force in Dublin GAA – fielding panels in four codes with teams from Senior right down to our vibrant academy. It could not have succeeded without you and the core values of the Association.

Finally to the youth of this club – this club is your inheritance, it is yours by right of playing and being part of the Association. The values it has are the values of fair play, participation and belonging. Wherever you go in the future, should you be a stranger in a strange town, county or country, look for the local GAA club. Its values will be what you grew up with and you will already be a member, by virtue of being a member of Naomh Olaf today.

This is the legacy of those who established the Association 125 years ago and it is your inheritance. It is precious, intangible and unique. All we ask is that you hand it on as it was handed to us.

If you do that, the next 125 years will be even better."

The burying of the club's time capsule was the next item on the agenda. Brendan McGlynn, one of the founder members of the club, assisted by his two grandsons, Oisín and Jack Horgan, performed this task. A commemorative tree was then planted by club members involved in the juvenile section (Bernard Walsh of the Boys' Academy, Ger O'Malley of the Boys' Juvenile Section and Mary Gibney of the Girls' Juvenile Section). Hopefully this section of the club will live to see the tree grow to maturity. Ven Naughton provided a cherry picker for the taking of photographs.

In conjunction with the day's events, the club coach Austin Lynch organised an Art Competition, which received eight hundred and seven entries. All in all, it was a very joyous and memorable occasion.

So successful was the venture throughout the thirty two counties that a Lá na gClub was again held on the 9th July 2010. On this occasion the club had no formal ceremonies. Events began with a sponsored walk at 1p.m. An ice cream van was awaiting the children on their return to the clubhouse. The Samba Band generated a great atmosphere and the wonderful sunshine added to the sense of occasion. Sinéad Cassidy, the club's Irish & Cultural Officer, along with her team of helpers, had organised an excellent range of fun activities for the evening, which included face painting, wellie throwing, tug-of-war, spud and spoon race, sack race, poc fada, obstacle course,

St Benildus College and Naomh Olaf - Thirty years of working together - By Liam McLoughlin


Sport has an important function in school for young people. It promotes a healthy lifestyle, can make the daily drudgery of classes tolerable, fosters friendships and creates indelible memories. The teachers who volunteer to take teams have the opportunity to see their students in a new light and better understand them. Teaching in St Benildus College since 1974 and being involved with the hurling there has given me an appreciation of the very positive relationship that has existed from the beginning between Naomh Olaf GAA club and the school. I am proud of their shared endeavour in nurturing Gaelic Games and I am aware of the huge amount of voluntary effort involved. As I write this in the Spring of 2011, St Benildus College are both Dublin Colleges'Senior

"A" Hurling and Football Champions, the prestigious Double for the first time in our 45 year history. This is no mean feat. The College clearly continues to benefit, as it has always done from the work being done in the local primary schools and at club level. Looking back over the record of the College's successes over the past 30 years, as this article does, the substantial input of Naomh Olaf members in the Benildus story is clearly evident.

The very first Naomh Olaf names that come to mind are those of Fergal Keys and John O' Brien, Fergal played hurling and football for the school and John played football. John's father Bill O'Brien is one of the founding fathers of Naomh Olaf and in Septem-

ber 2011, John's son Sean will enter the College in First Year. When St Benildus College win the Dublin Colleges' Football Under 14A title in 1990, the team is backboned by Naomh Olaf players; David O'Brien, Stephen Heaney, Niall Mc Caffrey, Greg Naughton (RIP), Brendan Mc Glynn, Barry Lynch and David Johnson. These players, along with Des Murphy, are to the fore again when Benildus claim both the Dublin and Leinster Colleges' Hurling Under 16B titles in the autumn of 1992, defeating Bagnalstown C.C. in the Leinster decider on a memorable day in Naas, with David O'Brien and the heroic Niall Mc Caffrey outstanding. The lion-hearted Greg Naughton died tragically in early 2011. May he rest in peace.

Other Olaf's players who contributed in Benildus in these years include, Eoin Ryan, James O'Shea,Brian and Eric Horgan, Alan Lyons, Aidan Byrne and brothers, Tony O'Brien, David's older brother, John O'Brien, Gerard O'Malley, Cathal Daughton, Derek and Ken Naughton, Barry Kirwan and Kevin Buggy. Barry O'Brien (RIP) was the youngest of the O'Brien family from Clonard. During his years in the College he captains hurling and football teams. His passion for Gaelic games and for hurling in particular is only equalled by his commitment to excel. He wins a Fitzgibbon medal with the University of Limerick and in July 2002 leads the Dublin U21 Hurlers to a Leinster Final. A few weeks later on Saturday August 17th just as he was about to join the teaching staff in St Benildus College, he drowned accidentally on holiday in Mayo. His death was a terrible blow to the whole community. His memory lives on in the College through the Barry O'Brien Sports Scholarship Award which is awarded annually.

St Benildus College take the Under 14A Football title in 1995, defeating St Joseph's CBS Fairview, and there are now new names emerging. Mal Coughlan,

Stephen Kelly, John Harrington, Ronan Miley, John Whealans and Barry Duffy. Mal, "Harro" and Barry are also there when we win Hurling titles in 1997 and 1998 along with very reliable goalkeeper, Philip Conway, Brian Egan (RIP), John Mc Dermott, Stephen "Packie" Redmond, Shane Whyte, Stephen Kelly, Eoin Heaney, Kevin Doolan, Martin O'Shea, Michael Fahy, and Alex O'Brien. There are great days in Parnell Park and O'Toole Park. This very impressive group of players will collect a Senior Colleges title in 1999 along with Stephen Farrelly and Gary Wilkins and will help us retain that hurling title in 2000 and win a Senior B Football title. Brian Egan, near neighbour and student of mine dies tragically at the age of 18. Brian's gentle personality is still missed. Eoin Mc Caffrey is Senior Gaelic Player of the Year in 1999. St Benildus win an Under16 Football title also in 2000 with a strong Naomh Olaf presence. Shane Whyte, Caleb Murray, Stephen Browne, Sean Egan, Nicky Fennell and Conor Mc Mahon are part of this historic first Under 16A Football title win for Benildus.

This particular group of players I personally remember with great affection, their commitment, dedication and loyalty to club and school were at all times exemplary. Declan O'Dwyer goes on to play Senior Hurling for Dublin, winning National League Division One honours on May 1st 2011.

And at no stage can I forget the hard work, loyalty and friendship of the Benildus parents, great Naomh Olaf people, on whom you could always rely, Bill O'Brien, Mick Whyte, Brendan Mc Glynn, Larry Kinsella, Gerry Kelleher, Tom Dunford (RIP) and his wife Eithne, John Mc Grath, Fran O'Dwyer and many more. I have many memories. happy and sad, watching Declan O'Dwyer climbing the steps of the Lower Hogan Stand to collect his National League Hurling Medal on May 1st has to be balanced with the memory of young lives cut short and the thought of what might have been. But we will go on, and with confidence for with School and Club working together the future is bright, everyone wins and our young people benefit. And at the end of the day, that's the most important thing. So here's to thirty more good years! Come on the Olafs! Benildus Abu!

This group of players has represented the club with great honour and success over the last eight years. The same management team of Eoin Ryan, Gerry Murphy and James Whelan have coached them from Under 10 through to the present day Minor team. Ballinteer St John's.


